
Summer Shoot Schedule

Know Your Poisons!

Mt. Madonna has a lot of poison oak lurking around the range alongside the shooting trails and behind the targets. It's a good idea to be able to spot these plants and avoid contact with them, particularly if you're prone to an allergic reaction, but also for the safety of other people. The oils from the plants can travel on your clothes, shoes, and even skin and rub off when sitting at the picnic area (particularly if you put your feet up on the benches) or on the handle to the porta-potties.

If you're one of the unlucky folks like me who have a hard time with poison oak reactions, be sure to wash your hands regularly while at the range and shower immediately with Tecnu or Dawn soap or any one of the other products that work for you to get rid of any oils you might've come in contact with. Remove and wash your clothes immediately as well as your shoes. It also wouldn't hurt to take a mild



alcohol based wipe to your bow, release, and your arrows in case your hands came into contact with the oils and rubbed off onto your equipment. Karen Stewart (itching since June)

How to Play a 900 Target Round

Coming up in September are the CBH/SAA State 900 Target Championships. Now is the time to start practicing and on August 25th take the opportunity to participate in the MTBA Regional 900 Round held at Mt. Madonna.

A 900 round is similar to an Olympic FITA tournament. There are 3 rounds at different distances, 5 ends in each round, and each end consists of 6 arrows. The target face is a 122 cm target that is divided into 5 color zones: yellow, red, blue, blue, black, and white.

You start the shoot at the furthest distance for your age division and move closer for each round.

Distances for each division are:

- All Senior Divisions/Adults/Young Adults (Ages: 15+)
 60 yards 50 yards 40 yards
- Youth (Ages: 12 14)
 50 yards 40 yards 30 yards
- Cubs (Ages: under 12) 30 yards - 20 yards - 10 yards

There will be a five-minute time limit to shoot six arrows, with a 30 second warning before the time limit expires. The Director of Shooting (DOS) shall signal the start and finish of each end and shall use tournament control signals needed for safety. Once you have shot the 6 arrows for the end, move off the shooting line and wait for the signal to move forward. Use common shooting etiquette while on the line and moving off the line.

The tournament control signals are:

- Two (2) whistles to come to the shooting line
- One (1) whistles to start timing of shooting for score
- Three (3) whistles to go forward to score
- Four (4) or more for emergency stop of all shooting

Scoring is as follows:

- Inner yellow 10
- Outer yellow 9
- Inner Red 8
- Outer Red 7
- Inner Blue 6
- Outer Blue 5
- Inner Black 4Outer Black 3
- Inner White 2
- Outer White 1
- Outer write 1
- All others shall be scored as an "M" (miss)

The NFAA is a member of the International Field Archery Association and a national allied organization of the National Archery Association (NAA). The NAA promotes target archery. i.e.: Olympic style archery.

The NFAA is dedicated to the conservation and preservation of game and its natural habitat. The organization is very active in cooperating with federal and state agencies and other sportsmen and conservation organizations. It is resolved to foster, perpetuate and preserve "the use of the bow in accordance with its ancient and honorable traditions".

CBH/SAA now consists of 11 regions and about 40 archery clubs in California.
